COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to give you the necessary skills to master the California Spanish Language Standards for Spanish Literature Honors. This course will focus on the functions of

- · Advanced conversation, advanced reading
- Learning about the Spanish-speaking world, exchanging information, expressing attitudes, opinions, feelings, and emotions **in Spanish**.

All of the standards and goals of the class will be closely aligned with the **six major** components of the Spanish language:

· Reading, Writing, Speaking, Listening, Culture, Grammar.

This course will include readings of the full texts in its original version. The two-semester course and its activities are intended to teach and enhance a student's ability to: **Acquire**, **identify**, **understand**, **discuss**, **interpret and analyze** the form and content of literary works of **prose**, **poetry** and **drama** along with the **literary terms** and **conceptual aspects of art** and **history of the time**. The lessons are designed to help students interpret the figures of speech, tone, genre, style, characters, themes, and historical periods to develop their analytical and interpretative skills.

This course will provide you with language-use experiences that will enhance your ability to interact in real-world settings and ultimately prepare you for AP Spanish Language, higher second language acquisition, and your future.

Participation

- In this class you are **expected to speak Spanish** as much as possible. It is a Spanish class; therefore you must practice your Spanish. You do not have to be perfect, as long as you try and you will get a good grade on participation. Do not worry, we will learn together!
- You will receive **Dojo Points** for participating in class that will transfer into participation points in the gradebook.

CONSEQUENCES FOR NOT FOLLOWING EXPECTATIONS/NORMS

Breaking a rule is a conscious decision. Therefore, suffering the consequence for breaking a rule is also a decision **you** make. There will not be an in class discussion; any questions will be addressed at the end of class.

CLASS PROCEDURES/POLICIES

ENTERING THE CLASSROOM

- Be ready to come to class focused and ready to learn
- Greet Mrs. Pulido with a handshake and a "Buenos días" or "Buenas tardes." Reply a greeting in Spanish <u>making eye contact.</u>
- Put away all personal electronics in your backpack. This includes cellphones headphones, ear buds, etc. and no hoods over your head.
- After entering the classroom look at the board for the <u>Do Now.</u> Place your backpack behind your chair. Take out your necessary materials and begin to work. No hoodies or hats on are allowed during class time.

CELL PHONE POLICY

- Cell phones are to be put away in your backpack, not your pockets. (It is too tempting to sneak a peek when it's in your pocket, or it might fall out and break).
- If your cellphone is out for any reason, even just to check the time, it will be confiscated and taken to the office. No negotiations.
- Once confiscated the following are the consequences:
 - **First time** Your phone will be in the office and a parent or guardian has to come and pick it up after school that same **day**.
 - Second time- It will stay in the office for a week and a parent or guardian has to come and pick it up after the week is over.
 - o **Third time** It will stay in the office for a **semester** and a parent or guardian has to come and pick it up after the semester is over.
 - o **Fourth time** It will stay in the office for the whole school **year** and a parent or guardian has to come and pick it up after the year over.
- Just don't take out your cellphone at all during class. Please communicate with me if you have an emergency.
- Bring a watch if you want to know the time- there is a clock in the center of the classroom.

CLASSROOM CLEANLINESS

- Food, gum, candies etc. and drinks are not permitted during class time; only water.
- If food or drinks other than water is brought to class I will ask you to please put it away or throw it away.
- If food becomes a problem parents will be notified
- Before the end of every class period everyone is expected to leave their area **clean** and push their chairs under their desk.

RESTROOM POLICY

- You may ask to go to the restroom **after** the first **15 minutes** of class, any time in between and **before** the last **15 minutes** of class.
- I understand your need to go to the restroom and I will allow you that right. If restroom breaks become too frequent, you will be denied permission unless you show a doctor's note for a medical condition.
- A restroom break is not an excuse to wander around school, text for long periods of time, use social media, etc.
- You must ask for permission only in Spanish: "Señora Pulido, me permite ir al baño por favor?" Asking, "Puedo" is not acceptable.

CLASSROOM PROTOCOL

WHEN YOU WANT MY ATTENTION

- **Raise your hand** and wait until you are called on to speak. Do not speak out of turn.
- **Remain seated** until you are given permission to get out of your seat
- You can put your things away until the teacher **has given you permission** to pack up at the end of class.
- We will use instructional time from bell to bell

WHEN I WANT YOUR ATTENTION AS A CLASS

- I will stand in front of the room and **count down** from **5 to 1**. The procedure is as follows:
 - 1. **Realize** the teacher is standing in front of the room or **Listen** for the verbal signal. (5,4,3,2,1 zero conversations, all eyes on me)
 - 2. Turn and face me; pay attention and keep your eyes on me. (Help a friend)
 - 3. Be ready for instruction. I will have something to say

WHEN YOU ARE ABSENT, USE THE FOLLOWING STEPS

- Turn in any assignments that were due the day you were absent. (Your Responsibility)
- Check with a peer first to see what assignments you missed and pick up the handouts you need from me.
- Get the notes from a classmate
